Letter from the Superintendent

March was Developmental Disability Awareness month. In Crawford County, we planned activities and events by putting together a committee consisting of Crawford County Board of Developmental Disability staff in the following departments: Early Intervention, Preschool, SSA, Administration, as well as Special Olympics, day providers; Chrysalis, RNI INC, and Waycraft, transportation provider-OSS, and people



served. The group chose "Kindness Opens Doors" as this year's theme. We engaged the Schools in our County by offering a second grade coloring contest, middle school poster contest. Both contests awarded individual as well as class prizes. Each high school provided a varsity basketball player from the boys and girls team to team up with the Special Olympics team for a unified basketball game. The game was played at Bucyrus High School on Friday, March 31st. We had a record crowd that was estimated to be around 300. Admission was a nonperishable food item (for CCBDD's food pantry) or a monetary donation to Special Olympics. The game included announcing the winners of the coloring and poster competition, a concession stand, pep band, pep squad, throw for dough fundraiser, shirt sales, and a 50/50 drawing for special Olympics. This event filled up CCBDD's food and hygiene pantry and provided over \$2,000 to Special Olympics. CCBDD also hosted an adult experience where community members participated in a day traveling the county to learn about supports and services available to people with developmental disabilities. They were able to see first-hand adult day programs, community employment, Fairway Preschool, and a residential home. The goal of Developmental Disabilities Awareness and Inclusion month is to not only increase awareness but to encourage inclusion of people with developmental disabilities into their community. As you go through your day, please keep in mind our theme that Kindness Opens Doors!

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




Family Fun Night

Early Intervention



Crawford County Early Intervention received ARPA Grant monies from the State of Ohio. With some of those funds, they were able to order adapted toys and items to begin a lending library for infants and toddlers with developmental delays that are involved in Crawford County Board of Developmental Disabilities' Early Intervention Program. Early Intervention will be able to better serve the needs of local families with limited resources


that have children with developmental differences by lending items to them that they may not be able to obtain any other way. These items will soon be available through the Early Intervention Lending Library for families that are served by Early Intervention.











Adult Awareness Day

We hosted an adult half day event as part of March Developmental Disability awareness month. This year we had a handful of participants drop out at the last minute to make the number of participants smaller than usual, but we were able to show participants a lot of support and opportunities for people served. The day started off with everyone gathering at Trillium Event Center where they participated in interactive experiences to simulate some challenges people with developmental disabilities might experience. After a light breakfast, everyone loaded up on a transportation vehicle. Most of the people we support ride this vehicle to get to their day programs. Ohio Specialty Services (transportation company) provided the vehicle and driver for the day's events. The participants toured the community visiting a home where people live and Fairway Preschool. They also visited adult day service providers Chrysalis Advantage Point, RNI INC, Waycraft, the Roadside rest area maintained by Waycraft. Everyone returned to Trillium for lunch and listened to a presentation by CCBDD's speech language pathologist Bethany Rall. Participates also toured CCBDD's technology room where multiple low and high-tech supports are on display in an apartment-like setting to show how technology can support people to be more independent. This year's participants were Cindy Edwards (County Treasurer), Bob Britton (Superintendent of Bucyrus City Schools), Chad Schwemley (Bucyrus Fire Chief), Tom Grace (Salvation Army), Pastor Tancy (Addison Good Hope Lutheran Church), and Lori Burkhart (CCBDD Board member).



Special Olympics Fundraiser

The Special Olympics' fundraiser was held at the different adult day programs and Fairway Preschool. Individuals, students, and community members were encouraged to bring coins to donate for Special Olympics. The head of each location received a whipped cream pie, except for the location that had the most change donated, they would receive the Golden Pie. The Golden Pie consisted of vanilla pudding and whipped cream. This year the location that received the largest donation was Fairway Preschool and the CCBDD.






sheet, they were returned to CCBDD and then judged by Chargers for Change.
