

Crawford County Early Intervention Developmental Specialists work with children (who qualify through evaluation) on strategies to build skills in several areas, including language development. Here are a few ways to encourage speech development at home with infants and toddlers:

- **Repetitive words in play.** Use the same simple words over and over in play; such as "*p*, *Wee*, *Yay*, *Uh Oh*".
- Focus on communication. Talk with your baby, sing, and encourage imitation of sounds and gestures.
- **Read to your child.** Start reading when your child is a baby. Look for age-appropriate soft or board books or picture books that encourage kids to look while you name the pictures.
- Use everyday situations. To build on your child's speech and language, talk your way through the day. Name foods at the grocery store, explain what you're doing as you cook a meal or clean a room, and point out objects around the house. Keep things simple, but avoid "baby talk."

What is Early Intervention?

Early Intervention (EI) is a statewide system that provides coordinated services to parents of young children with disabilities and developmental delays. EI is grounded in the philosophy that young children learn best from familiar people in familiar settings. That is why our local EI team works with you in your home or other places that you and your family spend time to develop a coordinated plan.

Our local EI team is based out of the Crawford County Board of Developmental Disabilities. It consisting of Developmental Specialists, Occupational, Speech, and Physical Therapists, as well as visual, hearing and early childhood mental health specialists.

Early Intervention Services are free and voluntary for families in Crawford County that have an infant or toddler who are determined to have delays in one or more areas of development. The team

provides strategies for families to implement at home to improve the child's specific area of delay. A child can be referred to Help Me Grow for evaluation to determine eligibility. A parent, medical professional, and other sources can make the referral for evaluation. The phone number for referral to Help Me Grow is 419-562-4667.




GARY POFFENBAUGH

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Ryan Dyer and His Big Day on a Big Rig



Ryan Dyer has been on Becky Teynor's caseload since March of 2019. From the first visit she had at his home as his SSA, she could tell he was hooked on trucking and everything surrounding the idea of it- so much so he had to show her his computer set-up and showed her how his truck simulator worked. Steam's "American Truck Simulator" is what Ryan uses to ride the virtual open roads regularly when he's not working four days a week at the Bucyrus McDonald's. He is not able to have a driver's license because of having cerebral palsy, and he has been confined to a wheelchair his entire life. His DSP Tom Baum, from ISS, has been his staff for the last twenty-one years. He helps Ryan meet his needs and works on goals and aspirations with him- Ryan is a very determined guy and loves to see things go from ideas to finished products. One big dream of Ryan's was to ride in an actual semi-truck. Tom discussed with Ryan and Becky that he wanted to get in touch with Hord Family Farms. Tom knew how much it would mean to Ryan to do this, and he wanted to try to make it happen. Hord Family Farms is a local pig, cow, and grain farm that has been in the community for over 100 years. So, Tom made some phone calls,

and he was able to contact Janel Hord. She put him through to the head of trucking department, Chad Kin. Chad then scheduled the trip! It then propelled a media frenzy for Ryan that is not over yet! He was featured in the August 6th Crawford County Now article: "Bucyrus Man to Fulfill Dream as 'King of the Road.'"

Four days after the article published, he was on the road as a passenger to Findlay with the Hord driver Henry Teters. There was an obstacle with the ride. It took four men to safely place Ryan in the passenger seat. Pat Hord, CEO, Rick Bauer, and Scott Hoover assisted with lifting Ryan up into the truck and Tom was inside getting him in safely and secure. It's noted that Mr.Teters came in on his vacation day to see that Ryan's dream be fulfilled! They were able to drive by Ryan's mother Kathy Barker's workplace, so that she could take photos and see the fulfillment of his dream. Look out for another article on CCN to follow up about his ride. A worker from Hord's, Scott Hoover, who also helped him into the passenger seat, talked to Ryan about gaming before Ryan went on the semi ride. They discussed a farm simulator game, computer systems, and hard drives. Ryan explained that he built his own computer! These new community connections with Hord have led to Ryan making future plans to ride in a combine during harvest season!





Crawford County is blessed with numerous organizations who pride themselves in giving back to the community. 
